We welcome your interest and appreciation for enrolment to St Paul's College.

St Paul's has a long and proud history and tradition built on the strong Catholic values of the Marist Brothers. A Marist school for boys has been on this site since 1903. In 1955 the name of the school was changed to St Paul's College. The Marist values of 'excellence in all we do' permeate our Catholic faith and the academic expectations of our students.

The College is currently undertaking a major redevelopment and revitalisation programme. A strong and unified Board of Trustees together with the support of the Marist Brothers has developed a Strategic Plan the purpose of which is to ensure "St Paul's will be the College of choice for Catholic boys from the local community and from within the College's sphere of influence"


The development of the whole boy will be achieved through a strong and caring pastoral emphasis and participation in a wide range of sporting, musical and cultural activities.

Welcome from Marist Brothers – Founders of St Paul's College

The tradition of Catholic education that is known as "Marist" was begun by a French priest, Saint Marcellin Champagnat, in 1817. Today, Marist schools, colleges and universities are found in over seventy-five countries around the world, shaping young people to be good Christians and good citizens.



In New Zealand there are fifteen Marist schools that are well known for their academic, cultural and sporting achievements. In their attempt to personify the Christian faith, these schools are set apart by the closeness to the communities they serve, and for the strong spirit which exists within them.

At the heart of the Marist school is a distinctive spirituality. Marists commit themselves to living the gospel of Jesus with the same faith, hope and compassion that Mary did and this is the essence of their particular spiritual tradition.

What does this mean for St Paul's College?

- 1. Learning is seen by all students as important and all daily activities are directed to that end.
- 2. The graduate of St Paul's College would be recognized by his sense of community and his positive life direction.
- 3. St Paul's men are hard workers and persevere to the finish with commitment.
- 4. St Paul's men would recognize that while their DNA has divine origins under the cosmos they are humble men.
- 5. The community of the College would be characterised by high all round achievement and an ethos where families are enrolled.

Headmaster's Message "Boys must be taught how to be Men."

This statement is about the active need to teach boys about being men. It is not sufficient to simply say that boys eventually become men - they must be "taught".

For 118 years, St Pauls College has had an active part in this process; of teaching boys how to be men.

So how do Boys get taught how to become men?

Let's try 5 ways:

1. Boys are addressed en masse as gentlemen.

Not "lads", "boys", "students", "guys" or simply "you".

But Gentlemen.

This gives them status and aspiration to model their behaviour and direction in life.

Gentlemen are expected to have manners, hold themselves well and behave appropriately in all situations.

Boys need to be taught what manners are and what social respect is.



It is not sufficient to simply put on any clothes, as if to say "It doesn't matter what I wear". Boys need to be taught how to dress well in every situation.

At St Paul's College, we have been insistent that every boy wears a tie and that all 11-13 boys wear a blazer to all classes at school.

Teachers appreciate well-dressed students. Boys appreciate the positive comments they receive about their dress. Boys are more settled and are more serious students in their classrooms.


3. Boys need to be well qualified.

Every boy should leave St Paul's College with University Entrance in year 13 as a minimum. Gone are the days when anyone could get a job with little or no qualifications.

At St Paul's College, the curriculum is geared to ensure that boys leave with UE as their basic qualification.

Boys

Boys need to be taught the importance of deadlines for work.



4. Boys need to control impulsivity and to delay gratification.

Parents and teachers need to be constantly vigilant about this basic message

Boy's statement: "I am hungry."

Parent's response: "Wait until dinner."

Boys need to learn to put their hand up in the classroom and not call out.

Boys need to learn the five second rule of waiting before making any decision

Boys need to learn that they may be angry but NEVER violent in words or action.

5. Boys need to express themselves.

Boys need to be taught how to communicate, not be allowed to be grunters, how to introduce speakers, to have courage in speaking before others.

They need to have an opinion, to express that opinion confidently and to communicate well with other people.

Boys need to learn appropriate communication in words, in the tone of voice and in gesture.

My prayer is that St Paul's gentlemen become strong men with these qualities.

"Confortare esto vir"


This challenging motto, begun by Sacred Heart and continued by St Paul's to show the link that exists

PREFERENCE OF ENROLMENT

In order for a student to be successful in his application to attend St Paul's College, a Preference of Enrolment Certificate must be completed by all students. It requires the signature of Agents * of the Catholic Bishop confirming eligibility under one of five categories – the form is enclosed in the Application Pack:

- 5.1 The child has been baptised or is being prepared for baptism in the Catholic Church.
- 5.2 The child's parents/guardians have already allowed one or more of its siblings to be baptised in the Catholic faith.
- 5.3 At least one parent/guardian is a Catholic, and although their child has not yet been baptised, the child's participation in the life of the school could lead to the parents having the child baptised.
- 5.4 With the agreement of the child's parent/guardian, a grandparent or other significant adult in the child's life, such as an aunt, uncle or godparent, undertakes to support the child's formation in the faith and practices of the Catholic Church.
- 5.5 One or both of a child's non-Catholic parents/guardians is preparing to become a Catholic.

(*) Agents of the Catholic Bishop, Who May Sign the Certificate on His Behalf:

- 6.1.1 Parish Priest of their Parish of Residence
- 6.1.2 Assistant Priest of their Parish of Residence
- 6.1.3 Priests appointed under c. 517/1
- 6.1.4 Deacons and lay persons appointed to pastoral care under c. 517/2
- 6.1.5 Ethnic chaplains who liaise with parish priests or their delegate
- 6.1.6 Local committees appointed by the Bishop or by any of the above agents of the Bishop.

Many of our non-Catholic students apply under 5.4. The 'sponsor' under 5.4 will be living in Auckland, practicing their Catholic faith and be available to support the student in their faith journey.

In the event that a 'sponsor' is unavailable, the College can assist together with the student making a commitment to take part in the Sacramental Programme.

2021 ATTENDANCE DUES & FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTIONS

The St Paul's College Board of Trustees is responsible for collecting all Attendance Dues and Financial Contributions from parents/caregivers. The St Paul's College Board does this on its own behalf and on behalf of the Proprietor, St Paul's College Limited, (owned by the Marist Brothers) and the Catholic Education Services Board.

The annual contribution of \$2,200 has remained the same for the last three years.

Invoices/Statements:

Invoices/Statements are sent out to all families before the start of term and are available on request. Tax Receipts can be requested from the school as needed.

Attendance Dues

Attendance Dues are Compulsory and are approved by the Minister of Education under section 36 of The Private Schools Conditional Integration Act. The Attendance Dues are collected on behalf of the Proprietor and are used to repay debt to the Government. St Paul's College does not receive any of these proceeds. Attendance Dues are GST inclusive and do not qualify for the Tax Deductible Rebate.

Financial Contributions

Financial Contributions are voluntary. These are collected on behalf of the Board of Trustees, the Proprietor St Paul's College Limited and the Catholic Education Services Board.

The Financial Contributions for the **Board of Trustees** are used by the Board as a necessary supplement to the Operations Grant received from the Government in the general operation of the College. This includes providing additional teaching resources, music, sport, co-curricula activities and regular maintenance of the College buildings and property.

The Financial Contributions collected on behalf of the **Proprietor St Paul's College Limited** are to:

- Assist with the repayment of loans which have been borrowed by the Proprietor for capital
 works. These debts are from costs associated with the substantial capital works that have
 been done (such as the Marcellin Champagnat Building), and future capital upgrade of
 facilities at the College.
- Assist with the maintenance of the Chapel and other non-integrated areas of the College property which are available for use by all students at the College, and for other charges associated with the land or buildings.

The Financial Contributions for the **Catholic Education Services Board** are directly related to the work of the Religious Education Advisors associated with the Special Catholic Character programme of the College. These are paid to the Auckland Diocese who provide the support.

Priority of Allocation of Financial Contributions

Within the allocation of the Financial Contributions priority has been given to the payment of interest on the loan that was required to complete the Marcellin Champagnat Building. This interest charge plus associated payments currently totals \$100,000 per annum. This amount is paid to our Proprietor, St Paul's College Auckland Limited.

The amount paid to the Catholic Education Services Board is \$50 per student and is expected to total \$18,400 for the 2021 year.

The balance of the Financial Contributions after these two payments is then applied to St Paul's to supplement its Operational Grant as set out in the first paragraph above. The actual amount applied varies and is dependent on the rate of collection of Financial Contributions over the course of the year.

The allocation of the Financial Contributions is reviewed from time to time.

Compulsory BYOD for all year levels

St Paul's College requires all students to bring their devices to school to support a blended approach to teaching and learning in classrooms.

Students in **Years 7-11** will require a **Chromebook** of their choice that meets the following minimum specifications:

- Be a Chromebook device
- Be robust and study enough for school use
- A minimum battery life of 6 hours there will be no charging facilities at school.
- Minimum of 4GB of RAM
- Minimum of 16 GB storage
- Be wireless
- Insured against loss or damage the school will not accept responsibility for loss or damage occurring at school.
- Contain a Google chrome browser. We are a google classroom/app school
- Optional USB portal Some devices do not have a USB portal. You may wish to consider this so
 your child may be able to load additional software you may purchase or save their work on an
 external hard drive when needed.

Students in **Years 12- 13** must bring a suitable device such as a **Chromebook**, **Laptop**, **Netbook or Tablet** that meet the following specifications:

- Be portable, robust and sturdy enough for school use.
- A minimum battery life of 6 hours there will be no charging facilities at school
- Have a keypad
- Be wireless
- Contains anti-virus software if bringing a laptop or netbook
- Insured against loss or damage the school will not accept responsibility for loss or damage occurring at school.
- Contain a Google chrome browser. We are a google classroom/app school
- Optional USB portal Some devices do not have a USB portal. You may wish to consider this so
 your child may be able to load additional software you may purchase or save their work on an
 external hard drive when needed.

Please note that we will provide help to connect to the school Wi-Fi network. Beyond that the students will need to take responsibility for their own devices for problem solving and troubleshooting.

All students will be required to agree and sign an **Information Technology Acceptable Use Agreement** to use their devices at school.

To assist in the purchasing of your device St Paul's College has partnered with a number of suppliers to provide discount prices and bundle offers for your sons BYOD. You will need to identify yourself as a St Paul's parent to obtain these benefits.

SACRAMENTAL PROGRAMME

The Sacramental Programme offers students the opportunity to gain a deeper understanding of the Catholic Faith and have their questions answered.

In addition, it offers formation in the values of Christianity including integrity, respect, kindness, generosity, service and love, to assist the students to grow to their full potential – fully human, fully alive.

At the end of the course, each student has the possibility of receiving four sacraments if they choose:

- 1. Baptism
- 2. Confirmation
- 3. Confession/Reconciliation
- 4. Holy Communion

This Programme enables those students who apply to enrol at St Paul's College, who are not baptized in the Catholic faith and who do not fall within the Preference Criteria set out previously, to attend the College upon a commitment to completing the Sacramental Programme.
